
PETA may be in your neighborhood rounding up animals to kill

This is Maya. She was a happy and healthy dog. Surveillance video shows that PETA staff members took her from her home while her family was out. They later admitted putting her to death. Two PETA staff members were arrested for larceny.

According to records from the Virginia Department of Agriculture & Consumer Services, PETA, which is headquartered in Norfolk, took in 1,971 dogs and cats in 2011 and killed 1,911, a 97% rate of killing. Over the last 11 years, PETA has killed 29,426 animals.

If you live in Norfolk or a surrounding community, allowing your dog or cat to go outside unsupervised may place your pet in danger of being killed by PETA.
